

Thursday, March 8, 1934

2 5 m. & 3 m. cloudy, beginning to snow tonight.

Worked on the ice.

Took the milk down with the mules on the sled.

Friday, March 9, 1934

1 3 m. 1 6 m. cloudy, snowed an inch last night.

Cut a maple tree back of the carriage house & saved it up.

Took the milk down with the mules on the sled.

Saturday, March 10, 1934

Cut a 24 in maple.

Drove Bert & Gyp down with the milk on the scat.

Mother rode down with us & called on the Barretts. It is Mr. Barrett's 85th birthday. He sits up a while everyday now.

Tuesday, March 20, 1934

10 m. 31 m. Fair
5 ft. of snow to Aunt Abby.
Put a sleigh up over head in
the hay bolder shed and got
two buggys home that we
left in Mr. Barretts barn this
winter. Drove Bert & Giff
down with the milk on the ~~buggy~~
Sold 7 hides to a man from Canada
for \$6. 2¢ a pound.

Wednesday, March 21, 1934

10 m. 33 m. cloudy, squall after dinner
finished the tree we cut Monday
Mr. O Neil helped.
Drove Bert & Giff down with
the milk.

Thursday, March 22, 1934

14 m. 3 m. Fair.

Cut a 22 in maple sent it
to Mr. Mr. Ernest helped.

Friday, March 23, 1934

1 m. 1 pm. Fair.
Cut a 33 in maple & a 14 in maple
finished up the 14 in one.
Mr. O Neil helped.

Saturday, March 24, 1934

4 m. 23 m. cloudy forenoon. snow since 1 o'clock.

Worked on the big tree we cut yesterday.

72 ft. of wood to Aunt Eddie.

Hauled 2 loads of maple to wood up to the house with the mules.

6 a.m. 3 a.m. fair forenoon, cloudy afternoon, snow tonight

Gyr & the sleigh.

Cloudy forenoon. Fair afternoon

Covered the ice with straw hay.
Topped 4 trees, 4 bushes in the
Barn lot.

Drove Bert & Gryl down with
the milk on the buggy.
My knee is lame again.
